Message from The Venerable Master

A month has passed since I last communicated to the Craft in this medium. At that time, we talked about the struggle with the winter elements. But this is now behind us, for most of the Valley, and Easter is knocking on our door.

As I explained in my January letter about Christmas, Easter is also celebrated in Norway, far differently than here in the States. The Norwegian word for Easter is Paaske, a name derived from the Hebrew word "Pesach/Pasah" or Passover. In Norway, however, Easter does not pass over very quickly. Norway has the

world's longest Easter holiday. Easter is an important holiday in Norway, giving Norwegians a chance to celebrate the arrival of Spring and to spend time with friends and family over a lengthy break from work and school. Half the population drives to the snow-packed mountains, and again, take the skis, and travel to the huts and cabins spread throughout the mountains, to live in the huts for up to a week. All supplies are pulled with them on sleds, behind the skiers. The theme of entertainment is Easter Crime genre, Easter nuts, and the Paganorigin Easter Tree. The sun and the snow have such an impact that sunburns are easily obtained by many outdoor participants. The other half of the population takes care of the duties and chores throughout the land until the "mountaineers" come back, and they trade places. This tradition is generally unchanged throughout the history of Norway.

This last weekend, March 23-24, a delegation of 4 brothers, our Secretary TC Chatman, Orator Dan Jobrack, Expert Nate Frickel, and I, traveled to Seattle for a Leadership Conference with the Scottish Rite. We will produce a report on this conference at a later date.

A reminder that our next meeting, on April 4th, is our Ceremony of Remembrance, and I hope all that are able will join us, and I especially invite our members on the outer perimeter of our Valley to come and participate. This is an open meeting where your spouse, Blue Lodge members and friends are welcome to attend. "Scottish Rite—What Are We? Seven Scottish Rite members from Orient of Montana just returned from one of the three regional workshops put on by Supreme Council. We had planned on a few more to attend but illnesses and last-minute work demands have no respect for a fine conference. These workshops are only presented every two years so it is good to hit the timing right to be able to attend one. I heard several of our contingency comment that they were glad that the Valley encouraged them to attend when they had reluctance. They learned much and enjoyed sharing Scottish Rite with Brothers from other Orients—including Hawaii and Alaska.

One session was on "Preparing to Be an Emerging Leader." The Presenter was Scott Brown, a young Mason from the Orient of Washington, D.C. He gave me his notes with a countdown of ten top items to be an effective emerging leader. I found these to be insightful and applicable not only to new leaders but even the seasoned ones. They are:

- 10 Concept: Leadership creates an environment
- 9 Say YES to opportunity
- 8 If you say yes commit
- 7 Stay organized
- 6 Communication is key
- 5 Be responsive
- 4 Compliments vs. Criticism / Give thanks
- 3 Take advantage of social media
- 2 Leadership with title vs. leadership without (you don't need to have a title to be a leader)
- 1 Be Consistent (Intensity vs. consistency)

These factors require a leader to create a culture that inspires others to work together for a common goal. To create that environment for success, the leader assumes demanding responsibilities such as commitment, organization, timely communication, responsive and consistency. The leader needs to make the environment friendly and conducive to productivity by looking for the positive and mitigating the negative. These are good principles and worthy of our attention since Masonry needs to cultivate and inspire its members to be leaders in and out of the lodge. As Scott commented our society needs quality leaders and Masonry is the ideal training ground because we start with men of integrity and good character.

The workshop had fun and challenging trivia questions, such as identifying the number of the degree associated with pictures of aprons and jewels. This was humbling but showed the benefit of education.

The Grand Commander did a touching and fitting closing when he reminded us that the product of Scottish Rite Freemasonry is to ensure that our brothers be needed, wanted and loved. He was proud to say that the "light is still burning in the window of Scottish Rite Freemasonry" and though it may be dim at times, it is always burning to make others be needed, wanted and loved. So may we prepare ourselves as Masons to keep the light burning in the window and make our brothers and sisters of this world know they are needed, wanted and loved. That is what our mission is and we can provide the leadership to make it happen.




