## *Message from The Venerable Master*



I had three different style articles in a concept, ready to finish up this morning, and my wife and I had to rush Emma to the clinic, fearing that she had a strep infection. While we were in the exam room, three Norman Rockwell (1894-1978, Red Mountain Lodge #63 F.&A.M., Arlington, Vermont) prints on the wall caught my eye.

This instantly brought me back to my own childhood, being a 1960 model, growing up on a Norwegian farm, with all the chores and responsibilities that comes with it. September and October, which were two of the busiest months of the year, was the time when we would harvest all the different crops. On our weekend trip in the mountains to gather our sheep and cows, the whole family was on a scouting mission, looking for wild berries and wild game for the upcoming hunting season, as well. The most sought-after berries were the wild cloudberry, and lingonberry, which we brought home in buckets for processing. Between the second and third week of October, schools gave a “Harvest Vacation”. During this time, students hired out to all nearby farms to complete the potato harvest. This was hard, manual labor, where each was given a set parcel, based on their capabilities. Picking potatoes was, besides haying, one of the hardest back-breaking jobs. The tractor with a throw wheel would expose the potatoes above ground, and the pickers would follow behind, with their basket between their knees, and pick the parcel. To be handed a paycheck on the last day was a testimony to how well you did your job and how large of a parcel you could manage. The paycheck was, most of the time, big enough to cover going to the fair and carnival the following week, buy new winter clothes and shoes, and most of the time there was enough money left to buy materials to prepare for Christmas, and maybe even buy new ski gear, since we somehow managed to grow out of the gear from the previous year. I remember that I tried to stretch my money by buying used gear from older kids in the valley. This reflection on the “old days”, seems to most of us as a dream, but it truly shone through in the art of Norman Rockwell.

My wife and I are now back home, and Emma is trying to sleep on the couch, surrounded by the comforts of home. The doctor could not determine what infection she has, but she took some tests and we should have the results soon. Sitting and looking at her, knowing that she and her generation are the future, and what our generation teaches them, will be what guides them through their lives. For those of us who grew up in a time where freedom was given as a reward from the responsibility we took, it is hard to recognize this concept in today’s society. Through the modernization of our world, and elimination of hands-on education (mandatory woodshop, school kitchen, p.e., music, art) for the youth, we have created a society of entitlement and freedom, but without the responsibility that creates it. As Masons, we should be ready to take on this challenge, and change the course within our educational institutions. We once did it before, when we helped raise money for schoolhouses, and instituted public education, with the purpose of creating a well-informed and educated community around the world. So, a hint to all Masons: retake the positions as we once had. Become active with the school boards and become a part of the groups that will help make a difference in our communities. This humble approach could be made into a start for the students to want to take back responsibility.

As a tail end of this article, I would like to mention our Shoe Fittings, on October 13 and 27 from 8:00 to 11:00 am. Any brothers who would like to participate are welcome to show up for a cup of coffee and a doughnut. This is a heartfelt event. Our personal representative, Bob Hanson, made a suggestion to contact our youth groups, DeMolay and Job’s Daughters, to assist in the purchase of shoes, to make our inventory more in tune with the expectations of the youth today. I have been in contact with both groups, and both have responded positively to the idea.

## THE RITE CORNER



“Canadian Scottish Rite”

I had the honor of being invited to attend the 144<sup>th</sup> Annual Session of the Supreme Council of Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of Canada in London, Ontario. This was especially important Session as it celebrated the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the establishment of a Rose Croix Chapter in London, Ontario. From this act, Scottish Rite Masonry established firm roots in Canada. Ill. Brother Jack Rehberg, was a frequent visitor to many Canadian Supreme Council Sessions and quite a few Canadian brothers asked about him and told of enjoying his and Pat’s visits. The fellowship and hospitality shown to us proves why Ill. Brother Jack kept visiting Session after Session.

In 2003, the Scottish Rite of Canada started its version of Rite Care Clinics, which are called “Learning Centers.” Their symbol appropriately is a seated polar bear holding an equilateral triangle. Some testimonials of the patients and their parents, grandparents on their gratitude for the Learning Centers were in a brochure entitled “Tales from a Learning Centre.” I want to share one testimonial from a grateful grandfather, Dr. John Nornell. He wrote:

“I write this letter to relate the experience of my grandson, Carter, who is 9 years old. Carter was doing poorly at school, being mouthy with his mother, and really worrying his Grandpa. Being the product of a broken home, we blamed that for a bit of his behavior and learning problems. Tutors were hired, but nothing seem to help. Then I learned about the Scottish Rite Learning Centre for Dyslexic Children in London.

Carter was the first child to begin tutoring [at the Centre] in 2003. He was one of six children. He fought me physically not to go for [the first] two trips. These trips at 1.5 hours each way from [our home in] Chatham to London. After two trips, [there was] no more fighting. He could tell that early that things were easier at school, and his self-esteem quickly grew.

To-day, he is a happy little boy, doing well in school, and making his Grandpa proud. When I pick him up at school, there is scarcely a time when the principal or a teacher does not give me the thumbs up sign, and comment on how well he is doing.

Talking with other parents, this story is repeated time and time again. The results are so good that we almost feel guilty that our child is being helped while there are so many who need help as well.

I could go on for pages. I am so ecstatic with the way Carter’s life has turned around, but I will close by telling of the best present, the thing that makes all the time and gasoline worthwhile. Last week, Carter said to me, “Grandpa, I started reading Harry Potter.” I had to fight the tears, and lost.”

This is same feedback we hear from parents and grandparents of young patients to our Language Clinics but this confirms that our philanthropy is needed internationally and is having the same successes. Thanks to all who give of their time, resources and energy to support this Scottish Rite cause.


