Message from the Venerable Master



Greetings Brethren!

This month's article comes to you in a roundabout way from our Orator, Brother Gerald Giebink 32°. For those of you who were not able to attend the Lodge of Perfection meeting on March 6th, Bro. Gerald presented a fascinating enlightenment that was illuminating information to nearly all of us in attendance. The topic of his presentation was the Maundy Thursday observance.

When Bro. Gerald texted to inform me that he wanted to make this talk, I initially thought the message came through my phone garbled. Certainly, I speculated, he meant Monday – Thursday. However, I pondered, aren't we supposed to be Freemasons every day of the week? All I had to do is be patient, however, which every good Mason should endeavor to do (especially me, according to Milissa), and all would be made clear by Bro. Gerald's oration.

Bro. Gerald first learned of Maundy Thursday while performing his duties as the Billings Valley's VMAP (Valley Membership Achievement Project) coordinator. VMAP is a project that's mission is to help each Valley ensure every Scottish Rite Brother is provided with the best possible member experience and value for his membership. The tool used to achieve this goal is the VMAP workbook, which Bro. Gerald is responsible for completing and submitting to the Supreme Council on behalf of the Billings Valley each year.

In the workbook, Bro. Gerald noticed a curious category that could be completed to achieve its intended success. This category was the observance of Maundy Thursday. Being not certain what that meant, this motivated Bro. Gerald to investigate precisely what this celebration entailed.

According to Bro. Gerald's research, many Christians observe Maundy Thursday, or Holy Thursday, on the Thursday before Good Friday and Easter. This day always comes between March 19th and April 22nd. Furthermore, this day commemorates Jesus' last supper with his disciples.

"In Memoriam of Brother Chris"

David L. Nielsen, S.G.I.G. in Montana

On February 18, 2024, Masonry, Scottish Rite and I lost a wonderful friend, Brother Christopher Jeffrey Nathanael Lustgraaf, who died unexpectedly at the age of 33. I met Brother Chris for the first time at the joint Reunion of Helena and Great Falls Valleys held in Great Falls on May 20, 2023. I did the communication of the degrees and led discussion on the lessons of the degrees (i.e. I asked questions to the candidates.) When studying the degrees of Scottish Rite Freemasonry, the lessons of the degrees are really a study of human behavior in response to various influences. Brother Chris added valuable insight and a disciplined comprehension of human behavior portrayed in the degree being discussed. His explanation of psychological causes for typical human responses in different social interaction brought a new light in analyzing the degree lessons. When he commented on the lesson, it was humbly presented. We all appreciated the depth of his intellectual contributions to the learning. Later in the Reunion Brother Chris told me he had studied psychology in college. Only recently did I learn that he had a Doctorate in Social and Experimental Psychology.

The day after the Reunion in Great Falls, I was in coffee hour after the church service, and there was Brother Chris. Then I learned that not only was he a brother Mason, he was also working as the Education & Outreach Coordinator for the church. With these two connections, our fraternal bond strengthened. I had admiration for his intellect, humor, humility, and sincerity. I treasured learning from him and sharing our common beliefs. Later when I was in the church office, we continued talking about our mutual interests.

In late July 2023, Brother Chris told me had accepted a position at MSU-Northern, in Havre, Montana and would be leaving his hometown of Helena. Since I was a native of Bozeman, I understood the concern of moving from a city within the mountains to the flatter regions of Montana. In my career I had moved from Bozeman to Valley County. At least in Havre, one can see the Bears Paw Mountains to the south. We discussed the esthetic difference between living in the mountains and living in the prairie, and we agreed that mountain people can enjoy the prairie environment. We agreed to keep in touch and meet again at future Scottish Rite functions.

My regret when he left Helena was that it would be difficult to meet up again, and because I appreciated his insight and strength of character, I wanted to learn more about him and his philosophy of life.

During that meal in the upper room, Jesus washed his disciples' feet, referred to as The Maundy. He also gave them a new commandment, and it is recounted in John 13:34 as thus: "Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." In fact, the word "Maundy" comes from the Latin word "mandatum," which means, "commandment."

Jesus took the role of the servant of the house when he humbly washed each of his disciples' feet. The act of washing feet was a symbolic reminder of Jesus' authority to forgive sin. It was an act of service to his disciples and something a servant would have done.

According to the introduction of the Chapter of Rose Croix's Ceremony of Remembrance and Renewal, the wisdom offered by Jesus in John 13:34 are simple words. Yet, they express the most sublime truth that all men are brothers. In other words, we share one origin and one common obligation. Jesus taught this proclamation as the one absolute rule that can measure life.

In commemoration of this truth and of its relevance to the Scottish Rite, Rose Croix Chapters traditionally observed Maundy Thursday on the middle day of Holy Week. The Christian world traditionally fixed this date by using the day of Easter Sunday, which is the first Sunday after the full moon. This happens on or after March 21st, the vernal equinox. Freemasons have remembered this special day and have gathered throughout the world to reaffirm their faith in the universal fraternity of mankind.

Masonically, Maundy Thursday is envisioned as a ceremony to commemorate the "Extinguishing of the Symbolic Light," more specifically the crucifixion of Jesus Christ as is told in the gospel. On the immediate Sunday, there was a follow-up observance aptly called the "Relighting of the Symbolic Light," which marked the resurrection. The key point of this observance was to remember those brethren who have passed on in the preceding year. Where once these events were mandatory for Knights Rose Croix, in most locations they now serve as remembrance events open to everyone.

The first written record of Maundy Thursday was a ritual of the Eighteenth Degree which Charles de Ladebat wrote and published in 1856 in New Orleans. The Code of Statutes, which was adopted in 1866, lists Maundy Thursday as a feast day. Furthermore, as of 1878, the Statutes indicated its observance as obligatory.

In deference to the religious nature of the Maundy Thursday ceremonies, however, this all changed in 1994. It was deemed appropriate at that time that a Scottish Rite nonobligatory "Celebration of Remembrance and Renewal" should replace the traditional Maundy Thursday observance. This was established to be held near the vernal equinox on March 21st.

While seemingly a religious, and most specifically a Christian observance, it's been written that the ceremony seeks to, "commemorate the death of our most wise and perfect Master, not as inspired or divine, but as at least the greatest of humanity." In one description of the event, Arturo De Hoyos, Grand Archivist and Grand Historian of the Supreme Council, 33° Southern Jurisdiction, says, "The Ceremony of Remembrance and Renewal, including the Mystic Banquet, is not a religious observance. It is neither the Feast of Passover nor a Sacrament of Holy Communion, although it commemorates the spirit of both days. Annually, the observance is held near the vernal equinox."

I remembered that while he worked for the church, he would write short articles telling of upcoming church events, and in the articles, he would segue from gems of wisdom and reflections on life and spirituality to the announcement of happenings. To understand who Brother Chris was, here are quotes from his original profound thoughts that were artfully made a part of the announcements, and which reflect his sound character and profound faith:

ON CHANGE: "Change is a difficult path to navigate, but through change we are afforded the opportunity to grow. We can see this in the world around us. Spring has come, grass and leaves are growing, flowers bloom, and the cold white winter of the north has given way to the beauty of Spring. This is a season of renewal and rebirth, both for the land and the church."

ON COMMUNITY: "We are all part of a community of God. Dealing with difficulties, no matter how seemingly large or insignificant, is made much easier simply by knowing you have the support of others. At the end of the day, there is no shame in asking for help, whether it be from another person or from God. God never gives us more than we can handle, and challenge is a great way for us to grow."

ON BELIEF AND FINDING GOD: "Belief can mean different things to each of us, and look very different from person to person. It can refer to our spiritual or religious beliefs, belief in someone or something, or simply belief in ourselves. This belief is powerful, and can be used to drive our actions. When our actions are in line with our belief in God, we can accomplish great things, regardless of whether we understand God's plan or not. We have all heard the phrase that 'seeing is believing,' but when it comes to our spirituality, I would argue that believing is seeing. When we believe, God manifests Himself not only in the world around us, but also in the people around us."

Dealing with challenges can feel overwhelming, and how we deal with them depends on so many different factors. Is it a novel challenge, or something we're used to? Is it a small challenge that is easily handled, or something that completely overwhelms us? What coping mechanisms do we employ? These kinds of things nearly always depend on the person, situation, and so much more."

I hope these reflections from Brother Chris show who he was as a man and Mason, and what he held sacred in life. His messages give us the inspiration for purity of life, for higher thoughts, and greater achievements. I will miss him, but thanks be to God for him sharing his deep thoughts and guidance for us to navigate the currents of life.

Losing a friend who is young teaches us to devote time to share and learn from that friend because we know not when we might not have that opportunity.

May his life be a beacon of light for peace to his family, friends, and brothers. Farewell, dear Brother, farewell.

From our Librarian – Illustrious Tom Horning –

In 1986 four years before I joined the Masonic Lodge Brother Harold Davidson, who was then a professor of Library Sciences at Eastern Montana College began putting together the Billings Scottish Rite Masonic Library. It occupied one small repurposed former church classroom in the basement of the Scottish Rite building. Brother Davidson spent many of his own dollars to collect various Masonic printed materials: books, past proceedings of numerous appended bodies, out of print books, research lodge memberships, past publications of numerous research lodges, and various historic photographs, documents, and memorabilia. Over the years that single room absorbed three others, as the library grew. Brother Harold found the Dewey Decimal System inadequate to handle all the Masonic material, so he created his own system of cataloging and shelving books. I call it the Davidson Decimal System. The Billings Valley did at some point, begin awarding the library an annual grant of \$1000 annually for the furtherance of the library. The annual grant together with donations and sales of Masonic jewelry continues to sufficiently fund the libraries operations.

When, in 20214 Brother Harold realized that his time was short, he began seeking a replacement for himself as librarian. I was asked to meet with him, and to my surprise he told me that he would like me to take over. I had no background in Library Science, but Brother Harold told me that since I was a science teacher that I had undoubtedly spent some time in a library. I reluctantly agreed and subsequently spent many Thursday mornings after coffee learning as much as I could absorb, and Harold could communicate about Library Science I am still woefully ignorant of the intricate workings of a fully functioning library due to my own inadequacies, not due to Harold's monumental efforts to educate me.
