## *Message from our Personal Representative*

### **4<sup>th</sup> of July!**

When pondering the history of our July 4<sup>th</sup> celebration I came across this gem and wanted to share it with the craft. (*from Frederick Douglass's 1852 Independence Day Oration posted by J.L. Bell's blog, Boston 1775*).

J.L. Bell, over at his always-interesting blog, *Boston 1775*, puts it well when he writes that one of the reasons that Independence Day is celebrated on the 4<sup>th</sup>, rather than the 2<sup>nd</sup>, of July has a lot to do with the 4<sup>th</sup> being the day that there was a *public* declaration of an event that occurred two days before - the adoption of the Declaration of Independence by Congress on July 2. Bell writes about John Adams's July 3, 1776 letter to Abigail Adams where Adams correctly predicts just about everything about how American independence will be celebrated in the future, except for the date. (Bell also makes a good case for the role that the printed word played in cementing the 4<sup>th</sup> as the date for celebrating Independence Day.)

Public declarations - in the form of speeches - might not leap to mind as one of the elements of how Independence Day is celebrated today, however, orations have been a part of Independence Day celebrations since the 18<sup>th</sup> century - and, in fact, they continue to be a part of the celebration.

While most Independence Day speeches are - and have been - celebratory in nature, many have gone beyond mere celebration - some with political motives in mind, and others reflective, and willing to ask questions about freedom and independence. Some, in certain ways, combined all of these elements.

One well-known example is a speech delivered by Frederick Douglass at the request of the Rochester Anti-Slavery Sewing Society on July 5, 1852. The speech was delivered as part of the Independence Day observances in Rochester, NY. Douglass, of course, was a man who was born into slavery, escaped from slavery, and went on to become one of the foremost abolitionists in the United States. He was also one of the abolitionist movement's greatest speakers.

Who, but Frederick Douglass, might speak better of independence and freedom - and about the troubling hypocrisy many saw at the time, of celebrating independence and freedom while slavery in America persisted - than a man who escaped from slavery? (And just to tie these themes a bit tighter, it's worth remembering that slavery was addressed in a rough draft of the Declaration of Independence, with wording that was not included in the adopted version of the Declaration.)

## **THE RITE CORNER**

### **“Helping Children”**

Several years ago, I had the chance to tour the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Children, located in Dallas, Texas. It was founded in 1921 with the initial goal of caring for children with polio. Later its mission was changed to including other orthopedic conditions. It especially specializes in making prosthetics for children who are still growing. Several of the employees in the prosthetics’ department received their prosthetics as young patients at the hospital. They are proud members of the hospital staff carrying on the same type of help that they had received.

This first Scottish Rite Hospital was an inspiration for the Shrine to establish of its network of children’s hospitals throughout North America for treatment of children with orthopedic conditions and burns.

Later, Scottish Rite further expanded care to children with speech and language impediments. This was done through its many RiteCare facilities and program located in participating Valleys in the Southern Jurisdiction.

In 2019, the Scottish Rite Hospital opened a second facility in Frisco, Texas, which includes orthopedic and sports medicine care. Both facilities treat patients from all over the United States and parts of Mexico.

The point of this history of various Scottish Rite charities is to show that when Scottish Rite members saw need to help children with various disabling conditions--whether polio, orthopedic problems, speech or language impediments, or from sports-related injuries—they got together and put together a solution that would help at least some.

On May 24th, there was a horrific intentional mass murdering of 19 children and two teachers at a school in Uvalde, Texas by a lone gunman. This tragic event, coupled with a recent increase in other random deaths of innocent people from guns, has raised the question of what society can do to protect students who are seen as soft targets by shooters wanting to inflict catastrophic death and injury. Unfortunately, this latest school shooting is not the first, nor will it be the last. Coupled with these intentional acts of violence, children are also increasingly the victims of accidental shootings, even in the home—a place of security and safety.

So far, there does not seem to be any guaranteed solutions to stop or at least reverse the trends in increased injury and death to children caused by abuse or misuse of guns. Our society seems numb and paralyzed to do anything. We hope that society is not content in believing that having our children gunned down while attending elementary school is just one of those events that we will just have to “put up with,” or that accidental shootings are a normal risk of a child’s life.




## **Personal Representatives Message (continued from page 2)**

In this now-famous July 5, 1852 speech, Douglass looks to the past first, and speaks with admiration of the founders:

*“Fellow Citizens, I am not wanting in respect for the fathers of this republic. The signers of the Declaration of Independence were brave men. They were great men too — great enough to give fame to a great age. It does not often happen to a nation to raise, at one time, such a number of truly great men. The point from which I am compelled to view them is not, certainly, the most favorable; and yet I cannot contemplate their great deeds with less than admiration. They were statesmen, patriots and heroes, and for the good they did, and the principles they contended for, I will unite with you to honor their memory.”*

Later in the speech, he gets to his subject, and he speaks of the situation in America at the time, speaking directly about the celebration of Independence Day and slavery. The text gives a great sense of the fiery oratory of Douglass:

*“What, to the American slave, is your 4th of July? I answer: a day that reveals to him, more than all other days in the year, the gross injustice and cruelty to which he is the constant victim. To him, your celebration is a sham; your boasted liberty, an unholy license; your national greatness, swelling vanity; your sounds of rejoicing are empty and heartless; your denunciations of tyrants, brass fronted impudence; your shouts of liberty and equality, hollow mockery; your prayers and hymns, your sermons and thanksgivings, with all your religious parade, and solemnity, are, to him, mere bombast, fraud, deception, impiety, and hypocrisy — a thin veil to cover up crimes which would disgrace a nation of savages. There is not a nation on the earth guilty of practices, more shocking and bloody, than are the people of these United States, at this very hour.”*

May your celebration be grand!

## **June Message from our S.G.I.G. (continued from page 3) –**

If the Scottish Rite members in Texas in 1921 had said, “there is no cure for polio—it is beyond our control--we will do nothing and just hope children do not contract the virus,” there would not have been the establishment of a hospital to do the best that it can to treat polio, there would not have been expansion into orthopedic care for children, there would not have been speech pathology for speech defects, and there would not have been treatment for sports injuries. The final cure for polio was the Salk vaccine in 1954, but that did not prevent the Scottish Rite from doing the best that they could for the previous 31 years before that discovery.

I, like others, do not know what can be done to protect children from being harmed or killed from guns. I believe in safe and responsible use and ownership of guns, but individually and collectively we can force a change that will help stem the tide of needless death and suffering from deliberate and reckless use and possession of firearms. All that is needed is our commitment, as in 1921, to take this issue on.

The history of Scottish Rite Freemasonry is that when we see a need, we mobilize and work towards a solution. Preventing the murder of students in a classroom and protecting children from an accidental shooting is a dire need. The Texas Children’s Hospital has a plaque at its entryway that says, “Dedicated to the health and happiness of all children.” This mission statement sets the tone for our goal. With our trust being in God, our faith is well founded, and nothing is beyond our potential.
