Message from the Venerable Master



Greetings, Brethren!

We first learn about the importance of charity in Blue Lodge where we, as Master Masons, are taught that we should be charitable toward our fellow brethren, their widows and orphans. In the Scottish Rite, we expand on this belief through the 8th, 18th, 26th, 29th, 30th and 32nd Degrees in particular. In fact, Albert Pike has this to say about the importance of charity:

"Portable Chamber of Reflection, Part Two"

Last month's article outlined my plans to travel to Australia to find the places where my father had been stationed from 1943-1944 in the Northern Territory of Australia. I am pleased to report that quest was successful, and I found all three airfields where his unit, the 529th Squadron, had been based. I heard him tell of visiting a Masonic lodge in Australia. I found a lodge in Darwin, Darwin Lodge of Remembrance, No. 182 that was meeting on the one night in Darwin that we did not have other plans. So off I went to join in the brotherhood with Australian Masons. It was a wonderful time. I learned that my father could not have visited any lodge in Darwin during the war because the civilian population, except for a few essential persons, were forced to leave Darwin just before its being bombed on 19 February 1942 and not allowed to return until 1946. It was essentially a ghost town except for military defense units.

The second part of our journey was to visit Kakadu National Park located east of Darwin. Kakadu National Park is the original homeland of several clans of the Aboriginal people, who have inhabited this area for more than 65,000 years. The Park is jointly managed by a board consisting of members representing the Aboriginal clans and the Commonwealth. The Aboriginal culture has a strong spiritual connection to the land, which is based upon the belief that the first people created all features and landforms, plants, animals, and generations of people living there today, which means the land and all its features must be protected and used respectfully. The ancestors of the Aboriginals gave to future generations a cultural obligation to look after and clean up the land by burning small patches during the times when minimal harm would be done, but huge benefits would be gained. Burning the grass in cooler times reduces fuel loads that, if unabated, cause wildfires. This controlled burning does not damage the trees and allows the flora and fauna to recover in abundance. This ancient tradition, based upon spiritual obligation to respect and care for the land, continues to this day and has been adopted by the non-aboriginals as a very prudent practice.

The Aboriginals are a welcoming and peaceful people but expect respect for their cultural values. They share the beauty of their lands, even their homeland in Arnhem, which can only be visited by non-aboriginals by council permit. Arnhem is adjacent to Kakadu but independently owned and operated by the clans living there. All visitors must comply with their customs, such as no visiting of certain designated sacred sites by non-aboriginals, no taking pictures of some sacred rock art features, no pictures of bones at burial sites, and no abuse of the land and its features. These were easy and reasonable rules to follow.

The Aboriginals for centuries only allowed marriage between persons from different clans, and the appropriate clans are determined by a complex method based upon skin tones of other clans. The object is to have dissimilar skin tones between the bride and the groom. Mixed marriage between clans is the rule. This creates an attitude of cooperation for the hundreds of Aboriginal clans living in peace and harmony with each other for centuries.

- 2. When you can learn about other religions or spiritual practices, do it. It will strengthen the basis of your own beliefs. Comparing different practices is looking for similarities and for differences. Finding similarities builds respect for other practices, and finding differences will be rewarding in the maturing of one's own beliefs.

Enjoy the opportunities to gain new light and learn things that will enhance your Masonic knowledge. Masonry is a starting point for learning more about life but not necessarily the end all be all. I am looking forward to sharing with you on the trail to the light of knowledge.
